About these guidance notes

This document contains information and guidance to applicants submitting a **FULL** proposal to Health and Care Research Wales Fellowship Awards.

It is important that you read these guidance notes fully before starting to complete the application form to ensure that you provide the correct information.

We have endeavoured to cover all necessary information relating to the application form through these resources. Incorrectly completed applications may be rejected.

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Part 1: Background information

These guidance notes contain information relevant to both the Doctoral Fellowship and Advanced Fellowship. Please read the guidance carefully to ensure that you are following information relevant for the appropriate scheme.

1. Introduction to the call

Doctoral Fellowship

This integrated scheme provides opportunities for health and social care researchers to undertake a PhD by research, with full salary replacement. The scheme is for pre-doctoral researchers employed within Higher Education Institutes or staff employed by NHS or social care organisations wishing to undertake a PhD by research in a health or social care topic.

Funding can be requested to cover directly incurred salary costs (no overheads or indirect costs allowable) of the applicant for 3 years full-time funding, or 4- or 5-years part-time funding, their PhD tuition fees, and the costs of an appropriate research project and training and development programme.

The Doctoral Fellowship funds PhD projects which provide robust evidence that addresses the health and/or social care needs of the public, service users, carers and the wider population and/or the organisation and delivery of efficient and effective health and social care services in Wales. This scheme does not support basic research or work involving animals or their tissue. Applications for Global Health research are out of remit.

This is a **one-stage** application process. An applicant may only submit **one** application to this call per round. Eligible applications considered within remit and competitiveness will first go through a shortlisting panel, with the highest scoring applications continuing to external peer and public review where this is deemed necessary prior to the applicant being called for interview by the Panel.

Advanced Fellowship

This integrated scheme supports health and social care researchers to progress their research leadership trajectory. The scheme is for post-doctoral health and social care researchers at mid-career researcher or senior researcher stage of their career. Applicants must have been awarded their PhD at the point of interview and may not hold a professorial level appointment at the point of application.

The Advanced Fellowship is an individual training award which offers funding for salary costs of the individual for up to 3 years full-time funding, or 4- or 5-years part-time funding, and the costs of an appropriate research project and training and development programme.

The scheme will fund high quality research directed at supporting capacity building in health and social care related research. Applicants will need to demonstrate how their work will benefit the public, health service practice or policy, or service users and carers, social care and support services in Wales.

Where research is earlier in the translational pathway the potential for clinical application and/or impact should be achievable within a reasonable timeframe. Please note that research utilising animals is thus unlikely to be within scope unless the applicant can convince the funding panel of the likely benefits of their research for public, policy or practice. MRC Clinical and non-clinical fellowships schemes may be more appropriate if animal costings are integral to the research proposal. If time is needed to work up to a competitive MRC application, then the personal award accelerator may be an option to consider.

This is a **one-stage** application process. An applicant may only submit **one** application to this call. Eligible applications considered within remit and competitiveness will first go through a shortlisting panel, with the highest scoring applications continuing to external peer and public review where this is deemed necessary prior to the applicant being called for interview by the Panel.

1.1 Call remit

Doctoral Fellowship

The Doctoral Fellowship Award aims to support talented individuals to undertake research leading to the completion of a PhD and to support capacity building in health or social care research in Wales.

The Fellowship offers funding for directly incurred salary costs (no overheads or indirect costs allowable) for 3 years full-time funding, or 4- or 5-years part-time funding, PhD tuition fees, and the costs of an appropriate research project and training and development programme.

Applications are invited from pre-doctoral researchers employed within Higher Education Institutes or staff employed by NHS or social care organisations in Wales wishing to undertake a PhD in a health or social care topic. Proposals for PhD by Publication are not eligible for this fellowship.

Projects that are undertaken under this scheme are expected to have public and patient and/or service user benefit as well as clear relevance to Welsh Government policy priorities (see 1.2 Need and importance).

Advanced Fellowship

The Advanced Fellowship Award aims to support individuals to become independent researchers through leading and undertaking high-quality research.

The fellowship offers up to 3 years full-time funding, or 4- or 5-years part-time funding, to individuals have been awarded their PhD (at the latest by the point of interview) and do not hold a professorial level appointment at the point of application.

Applications are invited from individuals working across any health- or social-care-related discipline to undertake research which will benefit the public, health service practice or policy, or service users and carers, social care and support services in Wales.

The research element of the Fellowship should have clear relevance to the public, health or social care service users, carers, practitioners and policy makers. The research should provide robust evidence to support the efficient and effective organisation and delivery of health and/or social care services in Wales, and/or improved service user or carer wellbeing.

Evidence syntheses and meta-analyses can be incorporated within applications. Projects focused on pilot and feasibility work, or the early stages of intervention development where knowledge obtained from these preliminary studies will inform larger future bids, are eligible.

All applicants are expected to clearly articulate the likely impact of their findings in the short to medium term and explain how these will benefit the provision of health and/or social care services, the public or service user/carer wellbeing.

1.2 Need and importance

The Fellowship scheme offers funding opportunities across a broad range of health and social care-related topics. While all applications meeting the general terms of the call are eligible, Health and Care Research Wales places an emphasis on policy, practice and public need. All applicants will need to make a strong case for the need for and importance of their research proposal. This will include:

- a clear description of the health or care need they are addressing;
- the placing of the research proposed in the appropriate policy or practice context;
- a justification of the importance of that need, in terms of the scale of the problem and/or likely impact on those with the health or care need;
- a demonstration of a gap in the research evidence
- demonstration that the methods proposed are suitable for answering the research question.

1.3 Eligibility

- Applications for a fellowship term of up to 3 years (100% Whole Time Equivalent (WTE), 4 years (75% WTE) or 5 years (60% WTE) in duration will be accepted - see criteria below. If the application is successful, a contract for the delivery of the research will be placed with the host organisation and all funds for the research will be issued to that organisation.

Doctoral Fellowship

Applicants must satisfy the following criteria:

- Applicants must be based at an institution or organisation in Wales at the time of applying (or be in receipt of a job offer such that they will be based at a host institution in Wales at the time the Fellowship starts).
- Applicants will need to be able to undertake their PhD on a full-time basis over 3 years (100% Whole Time Equivalent (WTE), or part-time over 4 years (75% WTE) or 5 years (60% WTE).
- Applicants must be supported by a named PhD supervisor.
- Applicants must be in a position to commence activities by 1 October of the relevant year of award.
- Applications must have the support of the Host Institution.
- Where already registered for a PhD (or MPhil with transfer to PhD), applicants should not have been registered for more than 12 months at 100% WTE by the time the award starts.
- Applicants must be entirely funded for the duration of the award through the Doctoral Fellowship.
- Applications must include a clear and comprehensive training and development programme.
- Applicants applying for a full time Fellowship who are active clinicians or practitioners can dedicate an appropriate proportion of time to ensure maintenance of clinical or practice competencies.

Advanced Fellowship

Applicants must satisfy the following criteria:

- Applicants must be based at an institution or organisation in Wales at the time of applying (or be in receipt of a job offer such that they will be employed by a host institution in Wales at the time the Fellowship starts).
- Applicants will need to be able to undertake their award on a full-time basis over 3 years (100% Whole Time Equivalent (WTE)), or part-time over 4 years (75% WTE) or 5 years (60% WTE).
- Applicants must hold a research PhD

- Health and Care Research Wales will also accept applications from Applicants who have submitted their PhD thesis, or equivalent, to their institutions for assessment, provided they have been awarded their PhD by the point of interview.
- Applicants must not hold a professorial level appointment at the point of application.
- Individuals are eligible to be awarded up to two Advanced Fellowships sequentially, not normally totalling more than 6 years WTE of funding.
- Applicants must be supported by a named academic mentor.
- Applicants must be in a position to commence activities by 1 October of the relevant year of award.
- Applications must have the support of the Host Institution.
- Applications must include a clear and comprehensive training and development programme.
- Applicants applying for a full time Fellowship who are active clinicians or practitioners can dedicate an appropriate proportion of time to ensure maintenance of clinical or practice competencies.
- Applicants may have successfully held up to two previous post-doctoral awards upon application to this scheme.

1.4 Structure and Timetable

Doctoral Fellowship

The assessment process is as follows:

- All applications are initially reviewed to check they are within the programme and call remit and to identify any that are clearly not competitive*.
- Applications are prioritised by the Shortlisting Panel based on the assessment criteria for funding (Section 1.5).
- Shortlisted applications will be sent out for external expert and public review where this is deemed necessary prior to the applicant being called for interview by the Panel.
- Applicants will be asked to provide a short presentation of their project and answer questions from the Panel.
- The Panel makes funding recommendations to Health and Care Research Wales.

* 'Not competitive' means that a proposal is not of a sufficiently high standard to be taken forward for further assessment in comparison with other proposals received, because it has little or no realistic prospect of funding. This may be because of scientific quality, cost, scale/duration, or the makeup of the project team.

Advanced Fellowship

The assessment process is as follows:

- All applications are initially reviewed to check they are within the programme and call remit and to identify any that are clearly not competitive*.
- Applications are prioritised by the Shortlisting Panel based on the assessment criteria for funding (Section 1.5).
- Shortlisted applications will be sent out for external expert and public review where this is deemed necessary prior to the applicant being called for interview by the Panel.
- Applicants will be asked to provide a short presentation of their project and answer questions from the Panel.
- The Panel makes funding recommendations to Health and Care Research Wales.

1.5 Assessment criteria for funding

Doctoral Fellowship

Applications will be subject to examination to ensure fit with the scheme's remit and eligibility conditions. All applications deemed to be eligible will be reviewed for policy relevance and significance. This will include an assessment of the application's relevance to broader Welsh Government policy, and an assessment of the need and importance section. Applicants not progressing beyond this initial triage will be informed in writing at this stage.

Applications passing the triage stage will be assessed by the Health and Care Research Wales Shortlisting Panel, an academic panel including public involvement expertise that will assess the all-round quality and merit of the application, the applicant and the proposed host research environment. The peer review process aims to include public, service user, health and social care practitioners and academic reviewers where further expert review outside of the Panel is needed. Shortlisted applicants will be invited to interview with the Panel.

The Panel will make funding recommendations to Health and Care Research Wales (Welsh Government). Health and Care Research Wales (Welsh Government) will make the final funding decisions, considering the strength of Panel recommendations and available resources. These decisions are final and are not open to appeal.

Health and Care Research Wales Faculty expects to inform all applicants of the outcome in June 2024.

Advanced Fellowship

Applications will be judged on the potential and trajectory of the applicant as a researcher, the quality of the research proposed and on the quality of the academic and institutional support, and the training and development programme proposed. Applicants will be expected to demonstrate evidence of relevance to the public and/or service user community; feasibility of practical application; likely benefit and value for money. Applicants must also clearly justify the appropriateness, soundness and demonstrate rigour in methodology and design. The peer review process aims to include public, service user, health and social care practitioners and academic reviewers where further expert review outside of the Panel is needed.

The applicant will need to describe how they will report on expected findings in such a way that the research outcomes are open to critical examination by peers. Outputs from the scheme are likely to take the form of both peer-reviewed academic publications, and publications or other outputs designed to reach a wide practitioner and service user audience. Outputs are expected to influence the ways in which health and/or social care services are delivered.

Applications will be subject to examination to ensure fit with the scheme's remit and eligibility conditions. All applications deemed to be eligible will be reviewed for policy relevance and significance. This will include an assessment of the application's relevance to broader Welsh

Government policy, and an assessment of the need and importance section. Applications not progressed beyond this initial triage will be informed in writing.

Applications passing the triage stage will be assessed by the Health and Care Research Wales Shortlisting Panel, an academic panel including public involvement expertise that will assess the all-round quality and merit of the application, the applicant and the proposed host research environment along with the training and development programme. Shortlisted applicants will be invited to interview with the Panel.

The application form should be completed using size 12 Arial font with 1.5 line spacing and submitted in both Word and PDF format. The narrative CV template and references should be completed using a minimum size 10 font and single line spacing. All required authorised signatures (scanned or electronic) should be included and all signatories should be copied into the email.

1. Project summary

1.1 Scheme

Please tick the box to indicate whether you wish to apply for the Doctoral Fellowship or Advanced Fellowship.

1.2 Host organisation

Please give details of the organisation that will be the host or contractor if the project is funded and ensure that the correct organisation is identified as the primary one. This will be the institution with which the Welsh Government will enter into a formal contract should the application be successful.

1.3 Research title

(Limit: 200 characters)

The project title should clearly and concisely state the proposed research. Any abbreviations should be spelled out.

1.4 Project start date

Please note this should be 1 October 2024, whether this is a working day or not. Alternative start dates will only be considered in exceptional circumstances.

In planning the fellowship start date, you will need to take account of the necessary contracting and recruitment time and any ethics approval you may need prior to starting your research.

Health and Care Research Wales is committed to timeliness of research and rapid initiation of studies following panel assessment. Please note that should you be successful with your proposal we will expect your fellowship to commence on the 1 October 2024.

If you find that your circumstances change during the assessment process, and that you may need an exception to the start date (for example, if you will be taking leave of any kind) you **must inform Health and Care Research Wales as soon as you are aware of this**. Health and Care Research Wales reserves the right to withdraw the funding offer should the applicant fail to inform them of any changes in circumstances in a timely manner.

1.5 Project end date

Your fellowship can be undertaken on a full-time basis over up to 3 years (100% WTE), or part time over up to 4 years (75% WTE) or up to 5 years (60% WTE). Shorter fellowships are also encouraged.

1.6 Total award costs requested

You should enter the figure calculated in your Budget and Justification spreadsheet here. You should complete the separate Budget and Justification document and attach it as part of your application. Health and Care Research Wales will pay up to 80% of the Full Economic Cost (FEC) of the fellowship for Higher Education Institutes (HEIs). Up to 100% of costs requested for NHS organisations will be paid.

For guidance on how to complete the financial costs of your application, please see the financial guidance.

Please note, applicants wishing to collaborate with the SAIL databank should **ensure they engage SAIL sufficiently in the development of their application**. You should cost in the necessary data analyst or training time as a specified direct cost. **This is also applicable if you are planning to engage with Clinical Trials Units or Health and Care Economics Cymru.**

If you require NHS costs (As set out by [AcoRD guidance](#)), you must ensure they have been approved.

1.7 Scientific abstract

(Limit: 3500 characters)

Please provide a structured expert summary which outlines the background to the research, the aims of the work, including the question to be addressed by this research, the plan of investigation and a summary of the potential benefits to the public and/or to service users.

This should also include any additional points required to support statements made in the above sections, and any key references required to justify the points made (e.g., in the use of particular outcome measures or methods of analysis). This section of the application will be used as an overall summary, and therefore, should be a stand-alone section. Therefore, any abbreviations used elsewhere in the proposal should be defined here.

1.8 Summary (in plain English)

(Limit: 3500 characters)

Content

When writing your summary please include the following information (where appropriate):

- Aim(s) of the research
- Background to the research, specifically what is the problem being addressed and why this research is important
- Design and methods used
- Public involvement
- Dissemination

The importance of a plain English summary

A plain English summary is a clear explanation of your research, free from jargon and acronyms. The plain English summary is not the same as a scientific abstract - please do not cut and paste this or other sections of your application form to create the plain English summary.

Many reviewers use this summary to inform their review of your funding application. They include clinicians and researchers who do not have specialist knowledge of your field as well as policy makers and members of the public. If your application for funding is successful, the summary may be used on the Health and Care Research Wales and other websites.

A good quality plain English summary providing an easy-to-read overview of your whole study will help:

- those carrying out the review (reviewers and shortlisting and interview panel members) to have a better understanding of your research proposal.
- inform others about your research such as members of the public, health professionals, policy makers and the media.
- the research funders to publicise the research that they fund.

It is helpful to involve service users/carers/members of the public in developing a plain English summary.

Please note that the clarity of the plain English summary is assessed as part of the public reviewer assessment. If your plain English summary is considered poor, this may affect the funding decision. **If your application is considered strong enough in other ways to be funded but your plain English summary is poor, you will be asked to resubmit your plain English summary prior to funding approval.**

2. Project details

2.1 Reasons for applying

(Limit: 2000 characters)

Please indicate why you wish to apply for the Fellowship Award, providing justification for why this award is the right one for you at this point in your career. For applicants that have already commenced their PhD please provide details of what you have achieved so far.

2.2 Contribution of PhD supervisor (Doctoral Fellowship) / academic mentor (Advanced Fellowship)

(Limit: 2000 characters)

PhD supervisor (Doctoral Fellowship)

Please describe how the PhD supervisor will support you through the course of the fellowship, providing high-quality mentoring and supervision. They should be familiar with the research topic and methodology being used in the project, ideally having experience of supervising previous PhD students. Please provide details of their track record.

Academic Mentor (Advanced Fellowship)

Please describe how your academic mentor will support your overall development through the course of the fellowship. Your academic mentor should be familiar with the research topic and methodology being used in the research. Please give details of their track record.

Please note that funding will not support any payment to the supervisor/academic mentor.

2.3 Aims and objectives

(Limit: 3500 characters)

Please summarise the key aims and objectives of your fellowship and provide a concise statement of the proposed research.

2.4 Application type

(Limit: 50 characters)

Please state the type of application you are submitting; primary or secondary research. If applicable you should also state if your application is for a pilot or feasibility study.

2.5 History of application

(Limit: 2000 characters)

Please state 'Yes' or 'No' and indicate whether this or a similar application has previously been submitted to this or any other funding body. Where a proposal like this, or with similar content, has been submitted to this organisation or elsewhere please complete the necessary information.

We are keen to know if the proposal has been submitted elsewhere and you must be as open about this as possible. This includes, but is not limited to, any facts that, should they come to light at a future date, would embarrass either the programme or the individual who withheld the fact (e.g. if a member of the team holds a patent or has a financial interest within the research area).

Failure to disclose accurately or fully will be considered by the programme as academic misconduct and treated seriously. You should also include in this section information on whether this or a similar application has been submitted to any programme previously, or to any other funder. You should name and provide dates and outcomes of these.

2.6 Background and rationale

(Limit: 5000 characters)

Please provide evidence explaining why this research is important and how you expect to add to the body of knowledge with reference to current policy and practice **in Wales**. Please also explain the size and nature of the problem to be addressed and explain how findings may be exploited and implemented. You may provide a brief literature review, including, if appropriate, reference to previous or ongoing work which relates to that being proposed. Applicants should be aware of ongoing research in this area and comment on any other research which might be deemed to overlap with the contents of the proposal.

The rationale should aim to detail the:

- likely benefits of the proposed research to service users and the public;
- implications for the further development of social care or integrated social care and health practice;
- potential impact on local decision-making and improvements in service delivery.

2.7 Background and rationale evidence

(Limit: 2000 characters)

In addition to searching main bibliographic databases and research registers, applicants should check the list of existing research funded by [Health and Care Research Wales](#).

Please describe the existing evidence base for this research and demonstrate why this means your research is important now, both in terms of time and relevance.

The proposed standard for what constitutes a satisfactory review of the existing evidence to inform new primary research is as follows:

- Citing a relevant Cochrane Review (or)
- If no Cochrane Review exists, then citing another systematic review that is published in a peer reviewed journal (or)
- If no published systematic review is identified, then the research applicants should **present the findings** of a systematic review that the applicant has undertaken for the purposes of the application.

Importantly, if the applicants undertake and present the findings of their own review of the existing evidence undertaken systematically then they have to provide sufficient details of the methodologies employed to allow the review to be replicated.

2.8 Research plan

(Limit: 25000 characters)

Describe the proposed research plan, providing descriptions of the overall research design and a strong justification of sampling strategies, methods of data collection and analysis. It is vital to add as much detail as possible on design and methodology, including justification of sample size, power calculations and sample selection and exclusion criteria where applicable.

Fellowship Awards wish to encourage both qualitative and quantitative research designs and the panel recognises that these need to be presented in different ways. If appropriate, please include a copy of any questionnaires or other documents that you have prepared to be used as part of your study.

You are required to include a one-page Research Plan or Flowchart indicating a schedule for the completion of work, including the timing of key milestones and deliverables. Your Research Plan or Flowchart **must** be prepared in portrait format or it may be difficult for the panel to view the

Research plan:

Outline the design of your research including the methods you plan to use; the target organisations, staff groups/professions, service user group or disease area to be studied and brief details of the team involved in undertaking the research. Please ensure your fieldwork and methods are clearly connected to the aims and objectives and research questions you outlined earlier.

Design and theoretical/conceptual framework:

Please provide a brief statement on the type of study design to be used, and the theoretical framing, concepts and models to be used.

Target population:

Define the population from which the study sample receives the intervention concerned (or the control intervention where appropriate) e.g., women over 60, people with learning disability, people with advanced cancer.

Inclusion/exclusion criteria:

Please provide a detailed explanation of the inclusion/exclusion criteria.

Setting/context:

Please describe the service setting or context, in which the study will take place (such as the organisation or service type).

Search strategy (in the case of fellowships involving evidence synthesis):

Provide details of the body of existing evidence that will be covered and access arrangements (e.g. use of databases, hand-searching, communication with authors, etc.).

Sampling:

Please describe for all projects your approach and rationale for sampling or selecting research sites and subjects. For quantitative studies, if appropriate, state the required sample size, giving details of the estimated effect, size, power and/or precision employed in the calculation where applicable. You should also provide estimations of recruitment and retention rates.

Data collection:

Please describe the data you plan to collect. Depending upon your study design and methodology, you may need to explain what data collection instruments or measures you plan to use, and whether you will be using instruments already developed and tested elsewhere or instruments which you develop as part of this project. Provide a personal statement that reflects on your overarching goals and motivation for the activities in which you have been involved.

2. Contributions to the generation of knowledge/contributions to the generation of new ideas, tools, methodologies or knowledge

Explain how you have contributed to the generation of new ideas and hypotheses and which key skills you have used to develop ideas and test hypotheses. Highlight how you have communicated on your ideas and research results, both written and verbally, the funding you have won and any awards that you have received. You can include a small selection of outputs, with a description of why they are of particular relevance and why they are considered in the context of knowledge generation. Outputs can include open data sets, software, publications, commercial, entrepreneurial or industrial products, clinical practice developments, educational products, policy publications, evidence synthesis pieces and conference publications that you have generated.

3. Contributions to the development of individuals/the development of others and maintenance of effective working relationships

Highlight expertise you provided which was critical to the success of a team or team members including project management, collaborative contributions, and team support. It can include your teaching activities, workshops or summer schools in which you were involved (for undergrads, grads and post-grads as well as junior colleagues), and the supervision of students and

Include examples of societal engagement and knowledge exchange. Include engagement with industry and the private sector. Mention engagement with the public sector, clients and the broader public. It can be used to highlight positive stakeholder feedback, inclusion of patients in processes and clinical trials, and other impacts across research, policy, practice and business. Any questionnaires or other documents that you have prepared to be used as part of your study should be available on request.

10. Suggested reviewers

You should provide details of two to three specialty experts who will be able to provide an independent assessment of your proposal using the template provided. Please note that the reviewers must not be from your host institution, or those of your academic mentor. In addition, you should not have recently (within the last five years) collaborated with any of the nominated reviewers. It is permissible to nominate overseas experts.

Nominated reviewers who are acceptable to Health and Care Research Wales may be approached shortly after the submission deadline. If they are willing to assist, they will be supplied with a copy of your proposal, an assessment form and guidance notes, and will be given a 2–3 week period to complete their review.

11. Acknowledgement

11.1 Agreement to the terms and conditions

In confirming your role as Lead Applicant in this application you confirm that the information given in this form is complete and correct and you take full responsibility for the accuracy of this submission. You shall be actively engaged in, and in day-to-day control of, the project. You confirm you understand progress reports will be required by the funding programme and no substantive variation in the scheme as outlined in the application will be permitted without prior reference to the funding programme.

Please note that where you have indicated engagement with a Clinical Trials Unit, we require a letter of support from your unit and this must be provided with your application.

Health and Care Research Wales will not accept letters of support from Welsh Government officials. If these are included they will be removed prior to assessment of the application.

Please attach the completed Lead Applicant narrative CV template. Guidance on completion is found in section 8 above.

13. Review and submit

You must submit your application form, with the attached budget and justification document and any other supporting documents by the stated deadline.

All Authorised Signatories (Lead Applicant and Research Team) should be copied into the application submission email.

We will not enter into negotiations for extensions and the deadline will be strictly observed. You should therefore plan your application carefully.

Annex

Social Care Research Guidelines: 'What is Social Care Research?'

Introduction

In 2014, Health and Care Research Wales reviewed definitions of social care from a range of UK and international sources. A one-day workshop was also convened to develop guidelines on the question of 'What is Social Care Research?' The workshop involved a range of stakeholders from England and Wales including research academics, social care practitioners, and members of the public.

The results of the workshop were collated and condensed into a number of key areas. These were distributed to a subset of workshop attendees for further comments and feedback until a consensus was reached.

It is important to consider the following as guidelines and not a definition of social care research. It is inevitable that some research projects, especially those conducted at the interface of social care and health, will be difficult to categorise as clearly belonging to one category or the other.

Guidelines

For Health and Care Research Wales to consider research to be 'Social Care Research', the research should broadly focus on at least one of the following:

- The provision of care, support, and personal assistance in the context of interpersonal relationships, whether formal or informal, in relation to: activities of daily living, maintenance of independence, social interaction, enabling the individual to play a fuller part in society, assisting individuals to manage complex relationships, and assisting the individual to access or receive services from a care home or other supported accommodation or to take advantage of educational facilities.
- The provision of: advice; practical assistance in the home; assistance with equipment and home adaptations; visiting and replacement care; meals; or facilities for occupational, social, cultural and recreational activities outside the home.
- The provision of: protection or social support services for children or adults in need or at risk, or those with social needs arising from illness, disability, age or poverty.
- The social needs of people receiving social care, and the services or initiatives addressing those needs, including: prevention of deterioration; promotion of physical or mental health; improving opportunities and life chances; strengthening families; and protecting human rights.
- The organisational systems, infrastructures, care settings, and/or personnel involved in the management and leadership, commissioning, provision, delivery, monitoring and evaluation of care and support services, and/or the interface between; or impact of the above on related systems such as healthcare, education, housing, and the criminal justice system.
- National and/or local policies that affect the ethos, commissioning, organisation, provision,

monitoring and evaluation, and delivery of care and support services.

- The improvement of social and community cohesion (rather than the individual).

Useful questions that can help inform whether a research project is Social Care Research include:

- What is the research question?
- Why is the research required?
- What is the purpose of the research and who or what might benefit? (Eligible examples could be: service users, service providers, carers, social care practitioners, professionals and non professionals, patients, academics and family).
- What are the social (care) outcomes?
- What is the relevance of the application to Welsh Government social care policy?
- Who might read the research results? (e.g. social care practitioners, policymakers, or academics).
