What is an inquiry?

A Committee can choose to undertake work on a particular topic or policy area. This can vary from a short, one-day inquiry, to many months of work.

Stages of an inquiry:

- Terms of reference: the topic and scope of an inquiry is published by the Committee.
- Public consultation: individuals and organisations are asked to share their thoughts and experiences of the topic, usually in writing.
- Evidence sessions: evidence is gathered by inviting experts, key organisations and those with relevant lived experience to give in-person evidence to the Committee.
- Final report: the Committee publishes a final report of their findings, with recommendations to the Welsh Government and other organisations.



Why get involved with a Committee inquiry?

- To strengthen scrutiny by providing new, expert and research-informed perspectives on a topic
- To help shape public debate and understanding
- To have an impact and contribute to work to improve public services
- To support the work of Members of the Senedd



Areas of Research Interest (ARIs)

Areas of Research Interest (ARIs) are policy issues or questions that a Committee has expressed an interest in seeing research evidence about. A Committee might open an ARI to scope or inform future work, identify witnesses, and gather research evidence to support scrutiny.

ARIs aim to broaden, deepen, and diversify the evidence available to the Senedd to improve scrutiny and law-making work. They offer a new way for Committees to engage with the research community.

ARIs help to ensure that the evidence used by committees comes from a diverse range of people, communities, sectors, groups and organisations.

Academics at all career stages, research institutions, and experts are encouraged to register their interest in an ARI, add their existing research in the topic areas to the ARI repository, provide their insights, and suggest questions that the Committee could ask the Welsh Government.



ARI – Innovation for improvement in healthcare

HSC Committee is interested in learning how the NHS could harness the power of emerging technologies to improve patient diagnosis, treatment and care.

The Committee would like to hear from researchers working to develop new therapeutic approaches and the use of new technologies that could help to drive innovation in healthcare Wales.
